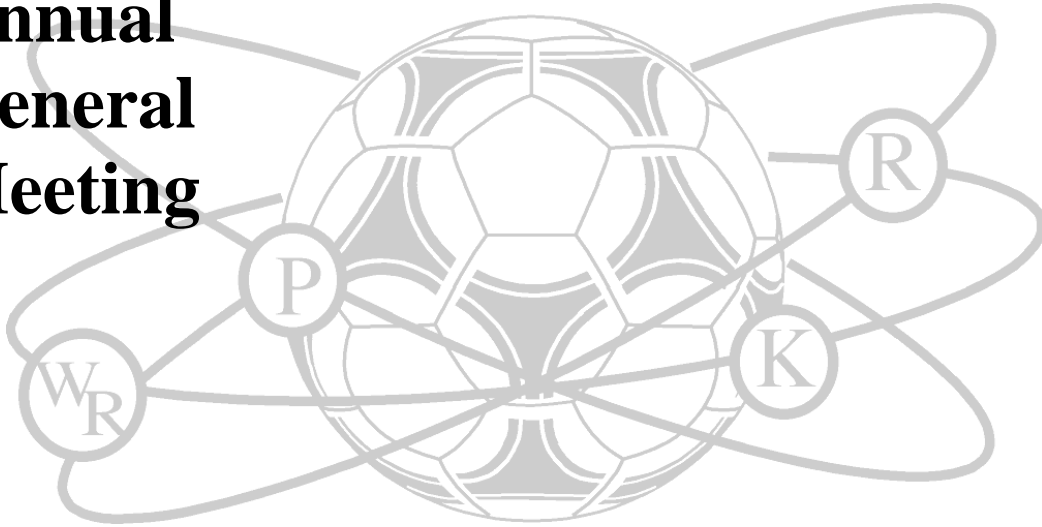

President – Dan Ollero

The President of the T-CYSA board oversees all activities of the T-CYSA and the work of the Board Members, and serves as Chairperson at the Annual General Meeting and all Board meetings. The President sees that all Bylaws, Rules of Competition, and Guidelines of T-CYSA are executed. The President establishes committees and appoints administrators as required.

I want to thank all the Board members this year for all their efforts, expertise and willingness to work together to make this a better association for its members. If not for the tireless efforts of these Board members, we would not have been able to implement as much as we did this year. The synergy among these Board members is one of cooperation and determination to get things done and making sure our efforts are helping to make our association better from a member, volunteer, and player experience.

Teri Ahlers, Penny Jansen, Sal Ghbein, Rick Dawson, Jon Page and Greg Thomas are the Board members whose positions are up for election. These six people have done a great job and this association has been blessed to have them. I also want to thank Mary King who stepped up to become the Kennewick Club Director and now will be stepping down. The Kennewick Club needed help getting organized and Mary did a great job.

One of the very positive things that happened this year is moving all the games to the complex. I have received so many comments from people that enjoy being at our complex on a Saturday morning to visit with people, see and experience the excitement, and of course, watch the kids having fun playing this great sport. A goal of this Board is to build a “community” environment and we have taken a big step in that direction.

This Board also took the time to go through a very positive strategic planning session. You will hear more about this in the coming months as we put together the information for all our members to see where our Board is trying to take this association.

Registration numbers continue to be a concern. In the most recent 5-years, we have been losing anywhere between 12 – 18 percent of our players from one year to the next. A good effort was made this year to get out more promotional material and advertising for registrations. As of September 14, 2005, registrations are at 2268 players, down only 91 players from last year. There are still programs we would like to implement in the coming year to help turn that number around and start increasing our player base.

The largest challenge this association faces today is coming up with other lines of income that will help implement better development programs and keep the cost of registrations to a minimum. This is a tough challenge in the face of rising costs to run this association. Our lease for the complex alone will rise from \$15K to \$30K over the next four years. We were able to find some other lines of income this year and will continue looking for other ways to cut expenses and increase income.

Lastly, and I’m sure you hear this every year. I would love to see more volunteer help within this association. There are many things to do and if you can donate even a little time, it would help this association immensely. Just talk to Teresa in the office or talk to any of the Board members and tell them how much time you have and what your interests are.

VP of Administration – Teri Ahlers

The VP of Administration presides over T-CYSA business in the temporary absence of the President, and maintains a current copy of the Bylaws and Guidelines. The VP of Administration also oversees registration, registrar activities, facilities, and special projects related to facility improvement.

Office Administration: Teresa Obenauer continues to keep the T-CYSA office running smoothly. She is has been a very dependable and supportive employee and we owe her many thanks. Please thank Teresa for all her hard work at keeping this organization running.

Quint Brown, our Facility Specialist, is doing a wonderful job of keeping lines on our playing fields and keeping up on the general maintenance of our great Complex. Since we moved all recreational games to the complex this fall, his work load has increased tremendously.

Concession Stand: Last winter, the T-CYSA concession stand got a new look and a new menu. The changes have been very positive and sales have been good. Please continue to encourage your team to support us with this on-going fund raiser for T-CYSA.

Volunteers: We need your help, Coaches. We need you to tell the all your team's parents that we need them. So many times we put out the word that we need new Board Members or help with certain projects and it is the same people every time who step up. Most of our Board members are already coaches so they are doing two jobs for this association. My question is: where are the other parents and why aren't they helping? As a coach, you can require parents from your team to step up and volunteer.

VP of Development –Greg Thomas

Online Coaching Tool

In February we introduced an online resource from Byte Size Coaching to help our coaches plan training sessions. Between February and October, our coaches visited the site nearly 1,000 times and viewed about 3,000 web pages.

The tool has features that make it useful for novice coaches as well as experienced coaches. For example, a novice coach can look at an entire season of complete training session plans; he/she can then simply organize the activities described in the plans, and the kids will learn and improve by playing in the activities, even if the coach is inexperienced. On the other hand, a veteran coach who knows his/her older team needs to work on the tactical aspects of shooting, for example, can use the tool's search feature to get a list of games that address that topic.

Center of Excellence

Our 13th annual Center of Excellence was held Mondays from March 7 to April 25. Approximately 210 U10-U11 players attended the camp.

The coaching curriculum was finalized by Ryan Stout and Mark Rice, two of our senior coaches and coaching instructors. The coaching staff included 17 coaches and 12 assistant coaches. The assistant coaches, who were all Three Rivers GU16-GU17 players, were each paired with a coach to supervise and mentor them. By giving our older players an opportunity to learn how to coach while they are still actively playing, we hope to encourage them and make it easier for them to coach later on.

Coaching Classes

We held 7 coaching classes this year: 4 in the spring and 3 in the fall. A total of 92 coaches attended the classes; 80 were T-CYSA coaches. The counts of T-CYSA and total coaches attending class are as follows:

- spring U8: 9/9
- spring U10: 10/10
- spring E: 10/13
- spring D: 6/13
- fall U6: 10/11
- fall U8: 9/9
- fall U10: 26/27

Ryan Stout taught the U6, U8, and U10 classes. Mike Washington taught the E and D classes.

Demo Training Sessions

We held 4 example training sessions during the fall season, in which a senior coach ran a complete training session with a team of youth players, and any coach could observe the session and ask questions. Each session was held in a different city with a different team, to make it easier for coaches to attend a session nearby. 25 teams volunteered to participate in a session, but only 3 coaches observed the sessions (1 in West Richland and

2 in Richland). Next year we will consider different scheduling options that may allow more coaches to observe the sessions.

Ryan Stout, who instructs many of our local coaching classes, ran 3 of the sessions. I ran the one Ryan was unable to.

Coaching Agreements

A common agreement for recreational coaches was written and made available to the city clubs for the fall season. This standardizes the behavioral expectations for recreational coaches across T-CYSA.

VP of Competition – Rob Winston

The VP of Competition shall schedule all T-CYSA competition, with emphasis on recreational league play and tournaments. The VP of Competition oversees the T-CYSA Head Referee and judicial functions (Recreational Rules and Protest committee) as required.

In 2005 T-CYSA has become compliant with the Washington State Youth Soccer Mod soccer rules and guidelines. All age groups now conform to the state guidelines mandated to be in compliance by 2006. The following table summarizes many of the different rules for each age group:

Director of Tournaments – Scott Ruf

The Director of Tournaments is responsible for organizing and hosting T-CYSA sponsored tournaments and jamborees. Responsibilities include 1) scheduling and sanction of T-CYSA tournament through WSYSA, 2) tournament organization, 3) announcement and summaries of tournaments for the T-CYSA newsletter, and 4) preparation of an annual summary report and finances of tournaments for the AGM.

TCYSA 2005 Tournaments and Events

Having been appointed to the position of Director of Tournaments in late Spring I was in a position to only oversee events during that time. We held a Spring Jamboree for our recreation teams, the Sagebrush Shootout over Memorial Day weekend, and TCYSA was the host site for the WSYSA U14 LPTs. All these events were successful and TCYSA received consistent praise on our facilities.

The weekend of November 5th we held the Fall Jamboree in a new one-day format, which was successful. We received compliments on the format and the fun players had. We had 44 teams including teams from Walla Walla, Yakima, Moses Lake, and Moxee. The teams played over 70 games and all was completed in late afternoon before the rain.

Since I had little influence or input to this past year's events I have already begun to make plans for 2006. In speaking to President Dan Ollero and VP of Competition Rob Winston we believe that our upcoming events can be bigger and better while helping to bring TCYSA to the forefront in competition and facilities on the eastside of Washington as well as the tri-state region.

Some of our plans for 2006 include combining events to make them bigger and offer more competition to outside clubs. The tentative schedule is as follows:

Director of Communication – Penny Jansen

The responsibilities of the Director of Communications include recording meeting minutes of Board meetings and the Annual General Meeting, administering T-CYSA interactions with the news media, coordinating team photographs and compiling a newsletter to coaches and players at least three times a year. In addition, Greg Thomas maintained an Internet web site to help communicate accurate and timely information to Association members and increase the interest, support, and participation of other soccer organizations.

A T-CYSA newsletter was issued after the 2004 AGM, and in both the spring and late summer/fall 2005. The layout was changed to give a more updated appearance. Several contests were initiated including giving free tickets to the Soccer Fair for participating in a word find “contest” and T-CYSA t-shirts for writing articles for the newsletter. Youth soccer players were encouraged to submit articles. The response and enthusiasm from the readers was positive.

Several individual mailings were issued to groups such as coaches and parents of recreational players and/or premier players for registration and tryout reminders. There has been an effort to increase the use of the website and decrease the number of actual mailings in order to centralize communications and to save money.

Yellow book coverage was dropped from the Quest Dex.

The Richland and T-CYSA reader boards were utilized for registration reminders in the Spring.

Print ads were run in the Tri-Cities, Yakima, and Walla Walla during registration and club tryouts. Tournament ads were run in both the Oregon and Washington State soccer newspapers. In addition, I've written three articles that have been published in “Play On.”

Press Releases and notices of events were faxed to the Herald, the local TV stations, and some of the local radio stations for the Sagebrush Tournament, for the Spaghetti Dinner with Shannon MacMillan, and for the Fall Jamboree. Although, we got no local coverage for the spaghetti dinner, the article about the Spaghetti Dinner was published in “Play On”, the WSYSL newspaper.

Weekly score reporting has been coordinated by Christina Stout and has really improved due to her communication with Jeff Morrow at the Herald, taking the time to collect schedules and forwarding them to the paper, and giving Coaches/Team managers a cell phone number for reporting by 6:00 p.m. on Sundays. Coaches are urged to take score reporting (wins or losses) seriously and to call EVERY week. Keeping the T-CYSA name in the paper as much as possible increases our public relations for free.

A new photographer, Star Images, was selected to take Fall photographs because of the benefits to the association. These included \$500 signing bonus and a fundraiser that, with active participation of all clubs, had the potential to earn T-CYSA \$6000. Many thanks go to Cindy Lackey for coordinating this fundraiser. Pasco is to be commended for almost 100% participation! There were a handful of complaints about not using a local photographer and about having to pay a sales tax to a different locality. There were also many favorable comments about the professionalism of the photographers, the quality of

the photographs, and the fundraiser.

Over 10,000 T-CYSA flyers were passed out at local elementary schools and placed on bulletin boards throughout the Tri-Cities to advertise spring registration. These flyers were printed with one side in Spanish and the other side in English for distribution in Kennewick and Pasco. The Boy Scouts were utilized for flyer distribution in Richland.

This position could really benefit from extra volunteers, for example one person per club for each of the following jobs: 1) write articles for the newsletter about their club news. 2) pass out flyers for registration in the local elementary schools. 3) serve on a photographer selection committee. 4) utilize contacts within local news organizations

Webmaster – Greg Thomas

Web site tasks accomplished since November 2004 include:

- Integrated the new external online coaching tool into our coaching pages.
- Worked with the VP of Competition to revise the recreational rules of competition so that we conform to WSYSA guidelines. Published the new rules and created a table that summarizes the differences between rules for different age groups.
- Worked with the VP of Competition to publish complete recreational team schedules.
- Added a link to the new Google map service, which provides maps, directions, and satellite photos.
- Replaced the useless WSYSA web ring links with US Youth Soccer news headline links.
- Continued updating content as usual: meetings, clinics, events, registration, tryouts, tournaments, State Cups, Center of Excellence, web site links, field maps, etc.

Future plans include continuing to ensure that information on the site is up to date, validating our HTML code to ensure that it meets modern standards, and providing an RSS feed or similar mechanism to allow users to be notified of changes.

Our website counted its 100,000th visit in July. It is currently at 109,271 and averaging 100 visits per day.

Treasurer – Lori Chin

Year 2004 Year End Reporting

In 2004, the Association realized an operating income of \$22,368.79. However, once yearend adjustments for depreciation and equipment disposal were made, the Association reported a net loss (as reported to the IRS) of \$18,524.69.

Year 2005 Reporting

Through October 2005, the projected 2005 total income is expected to be approximately \$245K, which is approximately \$18K more than received in 2004, but \$12K less than originally budgeted for in 2005. The increase in revenue over 2004 is primarily due to the full realization of the registration increase in mid 2004, the addition of a try-out fee for 3-Rivers and revenues generated from parking and concessions. Even with the increased revenue, and based on the revised budget, it is still anticipated that there will be an operating loss of approximately \$9K.

In mid-June, the Board realized there would be a budget shortage and began to scale back projects and trim costs where applicable. For the most part, costs are within the revised budgetary numbers. All members of the Board are aware of the budget constraints and are making every effort to minimize expenses. It is the Board's intentions to have Operations Income break even.

In comparison with 2004, costs are up approximately \$30K. Part of this increase is due to the addition of a Head Coach and summer training sessions for 3-Rivers. Another factor may be attributed to the increase in the lease payments to the City of Pasco for the use of the complex. In 2005, the Association will end up paying an additional \$10K in lease payments; \$5K increase for 2004 and \$5K increase for 2005. Concession costs have also increased significantly. This is primarily due to the increase in sales now that all games are being played at the Pasco complex.

Three Rivers Soccer Club Director – Sal Ghbein

The Three Rivers Club director provides for organization and reorganization of teams; ensures all District and WSYL players are properly registered; recruits coaches; and makes coaching assignments with the approval of the coach's selection committee.

The Director of the Three Rivers Soccer Club also ensures that each team has a full schedule at the higher levels of competition and that the administration of the select program is consistent with the association bylaws, rules of competition and association guidelines. The director of the Three Rivers Soccer Club also ensures the payment of entry fees for all league competition.

The Three Rivers Soccer Club includes all of the teams U12 to U19 that compete in either the Washington State Youth Premier League (Premier) or the District 6 Select League.

This year our Club has over 700 Players competing on 39 teams: 12 Premier and 27 District Select teams, which include six girls U-12 Developmental teams, two boys U-12 Developmental teams, and one boys U-12/U-13 combined team.

Following are highlights of Club activities:

Tryouts – This year the Club opted to combine Premier and Select tryouts rather than hold separate tryouts. Some of the benefits of this approach were reduced administrative burden and gaining some players on Premier teams that wouldn't have tried out had the tryouts been separate.

Combo Teams – Two separate boys' combo teams were formed this year to allow more players to stay involved in soccer: one at the U-12/U-13 level and one at the U-16/U-17 level. In both cases several boys would have been cut because there weren't enough players in their respective age groups to form age specific teams.

Club Training – Mike Washington was hired as the Club Head coach. As such, Mike is responsible for training Three Rivers teams. Mike worked with several teams to prepare for State Cup 2005. Mike also helped prepare the U14 teams and the GU-15 team for LPTs in the spring. All U-14 teams qualified as Premier teams. Summer training sessions were held primarily for U-12, U-13, and girl's U-14 teams. This was a pilot program that will hopefully be expanded in the future.

Training Outcomes:

We hired team trainers and trained the younger teams in the areas of technique; we ran a number of scenarios that were brought about by team shape and different roles of players within certain systems of play.

We wanted to look at the development of players within our club and how we could affect play as the players developed through older age group play. Also we wanted to see if we could be better prepared when L.P.T's come around.

We recognized that players are trained tactically, but lack the fundamental technical training needed to apply tactics in game situations. When and how to keep the ball possession, long passing to get out of pressure, and individual decisions. Wide play, crossing and finishing. Also runs to finish chances, how players make runs for themselves and each other was also addressed.

Overall I feel more time needs to spent in the younger age groups. Tony Waiters and Bobby Howe stated with material written U10-11-12 was the golden age of learning we need to look in that direction for the overall future of all our players so that we are better prepared for the game as we mature.

As we look towards State Cup preparation we will bring some College Coaches into the club for our older teams to be better prepared. And we will continue to address the issue of technique with the younger players.

A big thanks to Bob Downs, Ken Miller, and Mike Leonard who helped coordinate training for the younger teams.

Our hope is to keep the club running smoothly so that our children can continue to practice and play this awesome sport.

West Richland Recreational Club Director – Jon Page

I would like to extend thanks to the many people who have made a commitment to help our young athletes in West Richland. To all the coaches, assistants, team parents, referees, and everyone else who volunteered their time and talent, your help in promoting a positive environment for our kids to grow in is greatly appreciated.

I would also like to say a special thank you to Dave Elegy who has volunteered to take on the role of West Richland club director in 2006. Dave coaches a U9 girls' team in West Richland, was West Richland Coach of the Year in 2004 and is a member of the referees association.

One hundred forty four players and 16 teams called the West Richland club "home" during the Fall 2005 season. This is about an 18% decrease in the number of players versus last season. My hope is that as the West Richland area continues to grow we will find new ways to reach kids in our community and give them the opportunity to play the exciting game of soccer with a focus on fun and sportsmanship.

Pasco Recreational Club Director – Rick Dawson

2005 has turned out to be an outstanding year for the Pasco Club with an increase in player participation of 23% over last year. This has resulted in the creation of 6 additional teams over 2004. We continue to have difficulty in attracting players from the central and eastern portions of Pasco. In order to attract players from this area we will need to solidify our presence in the community and find ways to establish teams with positive mentors in these areas.

On the field things are fantastic; I continue to receive positive comments about all of the Pasco coaches. This year we have not only managed to attract a group of outstanding parent coaches but also several former college players to add their skills to our coaching ranks.
